Rusk County 4-H members are looking for ways they can give back to the community. So on Friday, October 9th at 10:00 a.m., to celebrate the Texas A&M Forest Service's 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary, One-Day 4-H will have a "featured service project" for the first time in the service events seven year history. The Forest Service is providing one Bur Oak Tree to each county across the state to be planted as a gift to the citizens of the county.

Also, during National 4-H week Tractor Supply will have its Paper Clover Fundraiser which will allow anybody who is shopping at their local Tractor Supply to donate a dollar which goes 100% to benefiting 4-H. The fundraiser runs from October 7th to October 18th. 4-H clubs will have the opportunity to sell paper clovers to help raise funds for the county 4-H clubs.
